The following motion was made during the meeting:

Motion #1

Councilmember Clausen moved to "replace the motion from May 23, 2017 with the following: Mayor Brackner will sign the Interlocal Agreement Creating a Regional Wastewater Treatment Rate Committee. The mayor and city attorney are directed to negotiate the city-specific agreement with Logan City. We further direct that our current collection cost will drop from the present rate to 27 cents/1,000 gallons of waste treated." Scott seconded the motion, which carried with Clausen, Scott, Smith and Wright in favor. Wilson opposed.

Proceedings of the Meeting:

The River Heights City Council met at 6:30 p.m. in the Ervin R. Crosbie Council Chambers in the River Heights City Building on Thursday, May 25, 2017. The meeting was called for the sole purpose of revisiting the motion made at the May 23rd meeting, concerning the sewer contract with Logan City.

Revisit the Motion Regarding the Interlocal Sewer Contract Between Logan and River Heights: Mayor Brackner informed he recently was made aware of a problem Logan City had with their wastewater system in 1996. The current contract stated River Heights would participate in treatment costs but was silent about collection costs. Between 1975 and 1995 Logan experienced some blockage problems that they had to get fixed. At the time, they asked River Heights to participate in the costs and River Heights said no, because the contract didn't address this. By 2006 Logan City started to charge for collection, so at this time, River Heights was charged as well. Mayor Brackner sees that Logan isn't always at fault. River Heights hasn't been very fair to Logan.

He read a letter from the Logan City Attorney drafted in 1996 to Mayor Logan Daines regarding the contract with River Heights.

He also handed out and read from discussions he's had with Mayor Petersen and Issa Hamud this week. Included was an update that Nibley City cannot opt out of their contract until the remaining 15 years has passed. (The Council wasn't aware of this when they voted two days ago.)

Mayor Brackner stated the Rate Setting Committee will be meeting on June 19 to discuss city specific sewer treatment agreements. Mr. Hamud said each agreement will be different, based on the individual city's needs, therefore he doesn't have a copy of the one River Heights would adopt. He also said he would support a 2-year termination clause, but cautioned it would go both ways.

Mayor Brackner asked what he should do.

Councilmember Smith informed that a couple weeks ago he was under the impression that each city was going to renegotiate their contracts, starting over with 30 years. Then he found out we would tweak our current contract and need to renegotiate in eight years, which wasn't appealing to him. Because of this and the fact that the information was vague and not in writing he voted 'no' on the last motion. He would like to have a written document in front of us before he votes in favor or give time for the city and city attorney to work through a contract which we feel good about.

Mayor Brackner recommended a modification of the current contract which would give us until 2025 to get a new one worked out.

Councilmember Wilson has never understood the pressure on River Heights to join or to make a decision. We are such a small part of the system. Councilmember Clausen answered that Mayor Brackner feels we should join and pay our fair share. The new rates go into effect on July 1. Mayor Brackner said Logan has offered that we can keep our contract but only change the rate.

Mayor Brackner said Logan is having to come up with \$116,000,000 and they are hoping those using the system will help pay. Councilmember Wilson has a lot of issues with the way Logan has bullied, manipulated and threatened River Heights over the years. Mayor Brackner reminded they have had a lot of extra costs that River Heights wouldn't participate in. Ms. Wilson reminded they have been making it up by collecting an extra 41 cents for collection ever since 2006 that we didn't know about beforehand, and we paid it. Mayor Brackner stated the amount they have collected is not very much in comparison to the costs.

Councilmember Clausen asked the Council if they should still have the mayor try to negotiate a 2 year opt out, knowing that Logan will ask for the same. Mayor Brackner opinion is to not go for that, but to stay with our old contract since we only have three years before the new plant is in before that's over. He doesn't believe Logan City would kick us out of their system after two years. Doug felt on Tuesday that if some new technology came along we could take advantage of it by backing out with Logan. Now he thinks that may be difficult because we'd have to join with Providence and Nibley and we wouldn't know what the cost of that would be. Although, he feels there is a remote possibility.

Councilmember Wright said now we know Nibley can't go to Hyrum for 15 years, it's no longer feasible for River Heights to join Hyrum. Mayor Brackner said he doesn't see Hyrum making their system economical for us.

Councilmember Wright is in favor of River Heights paying their fair share. He is in favor of River Heights signing the interlocal agreement as long as we get a fair city specific contract. It may take two weeks to negotiate or two years. Mayor Brackner said the rate committee is ready to raise rates the first of July. Mr. Wright suggested whether they charge us or not in July, we should impose it on our citizens because we will need to pay it someday. He suggested telling them we are still negotiating and will decide at some point. Mayor Brackner doesn't think we can join later with the new rates because it will foul up their system. We won't be involved in funding their capital system so why would they take us later. Mr. Wright agrees with going with the new rates July 1, even though we

are still looking at a contract. Meanwhile, we will increase sewer rates and put the extra in our enterprise fund. On the day we feel good about our new contract, we will hand the money over.

Councilmember Wilson moved to "keep the old contract, adjust our rates to build a reserve (rates to be determined at a later date) as we observe what happens with the progress and costs of the new treatment plant over the next 24 months." It's a motion to build a reserve but keep our options open.

Councilmember Wright asked about the timing of signing the interlocal agreement. Mayor Brackner said if we don't sign it, they don't know how to set up their computerized system for billing us. The treatment rate is the same for everyone except us, unless we go with the interlocal agreement. Collection is different, which is addressed in the individual contracts. Councilmember Wright guesses there is no feasible way to opt out of the current contract if we sign the interlocal agreement now. He asked what it would mean to have Logan opt us out. Mayor Brackner said Issa Hamud said given the circumstances, this wouldn't be good for River Heights, but he said they wouldn't do that. Mr. Wright asked what the worst thing is that could happen. Councilmember Smith said their opt out may be to raise our rates. He wondered if we amended our current contract if we could have it done by July 1. Mayor Brackner thought it could be done. He informed they would like each city to use the same template, with the specific city differences listed. Councilmember Smith doesn't think River Heights will go to any other wastewater system in the next seven years.

Mayor Brackner said if we don't switch over they can still charge us the 41cents for collection fee.

Councilmember Wilson said there is so much probability out there, that she can't vote for it.

Councilmember Wright asked for pros and cons of a 2-year opt out. Mayor Brackner said a pro is, we could go somewhere else if another option becomes available. A con would be if Logan were to terminate us in two years, we would have to seek somewhere else. He doubts that would happen since it's not legal and there's not really anywhere else to go. So, there's not a con.

Councilmember Wilson feels everyone on the council wants to be fair and pay our share. She supports raising the rates to save up, rather than pay Logan City now.

Councilmember Wright asked if we leave the previous motion as is, or take the 2-year thing out? He's hearing it doesn't really matter. Mayor Brackner said the old contract would stay the same except for the rate and we would put in a clause that our collection costs would be 27 cents. Another item is whether or not we put in the 2-year opt out option.

Councilmember Wright wonders if there are any legal benefits to any of these decisions. Mayor Brackner said Attorney Jenkins said once the Council agrees on what they are going to do, he can work out the details with the Logan City attorney.

Mayor Brackner asked for a second to Councilmember Wilson's motion, which was re-read. There was none. He asked for another motion. There was none. Councilmember Wright read the motion from two days ago. He suggested modifying the motion to include a request that the mayor and attorney negotiate our city-specific contract.

Councilmember Clausen moved to "replace the motion from May 23, 2017 with the following: Mayor Brackner will sign the Interlocal Agreement Creating a Regional Wastewater Treatment Rate Committee. The mayor and city attorney are directed to negotiate the city-specific agreement with Logan City. We further direct that our current collection cost will drop from the present rate to 27 cents/1,000 gallons of waste treated." Scott seconded the motion, which carried with Clausen, Scott, Smith and Wright in favor. Wilson opposed.

The meeting adjourned at 8:10 p.m.

I'll get back to you ASAP. Your Council member is wrong (I think) about Nibley. Nibley signed a 30 year agreement and it has 15 years left. It provides for opt out on two year notice after 15 more years.

Dear Craig,

The River Heights City (RHC) Council voted 3 to 2 to sign the "Interlocal Agreement Creating Regional Wastewater Treatment Rate Committee" and to comply with its terms provided that:

- 1. The present contract signed in 1975 be amended to change the rates charged to RHC to be the same as charged the other five cities, and
- 2. A provision that RHC can opt out of the contract if RHC gives a 24 month notification.

One of our city councilors reported that the City of Nibley can opt out of their contract if they give a 24 month notice and several of our city councilors wanted the same option for RHC. I stated that I have had no discussion about a 24 month notification of termination but the Council agreed that If Logan is unwilling to accept the 24 month notice that I am instructed to not sign the interlocal agreement

Another item that must be addressed is the collection cost. Issa Hamud stated at the last Rate Committee meeting that RHC was obligated by our contract to pay \$.41 per thousand gallons of wastewater treated. In fact, the 1975 contract is silent regarding collection cost and we need to amend it to state that RHC will be charged \$.27 per thousand gallons of wastewater treated.

I am hopeful that Logan will agree with these proposed changes to our contract and this issue can be resolved. If so, I recommend that Kymber Housley and our city legal counsel, Jon Jenkins, meet to draft the changes proposed.

Let me know your decision at your early convenience.

Hi Christine,

Thanks to you and Issa for sending this e-mail to me. I have left a message on Issa's telephone to call me. Would you please pass this e-mail message to him.

The River Heights City council voted 3 to 2 to sign the Wastewater Interlocal Agreement and pay the rates that the other 5 cities will pay but they also required that RHC could withdraw from the agreement with a 24 month notice. One of our city councilors had spoken with a representative of Nibley and understood that Nibley has such an agreement. Mayor Petersen clarified today that this is true only after the current contract matures in 15 more years. Because the vote was taken by our city council with faulty information, I have called a special meeting for tonight so they can clarify what their decision. Two councilors have indicated that they do not know what the separate agreement will require and have expressed reservations about approving the Wastewater Interlocal Agreement until we know. Is it possible for you to send me a copy of the "City Specific Sewer Treatment Agreement" referred to in the agenda for the June 19th Rate Setting Committee meeting?

Subject: Sewer Agreement

Mayor Brackner,

I have your email and I understand your point of view on the two-year term condition your council attached to the approval of the new rates. I reviewed your current agreement specifically section 8 of the agreement (page 3 and 4) regarding the effective period, and also reviewed the Nibley City's current agreement section 12 regarding the effective period. Attached is a pdf copy of your agreement and Nibley City's agreement for your reference. The termination notice contemplated in these agreements is only effective after the agreement runs its course. If you think your council is interested to have the option to terminate the agreement with two years notice I am supportive of that and the new agreement will have a termination clause which will say either party can terminate the agreement with two years written notice. After our phone conversation, I had the opportunity to visit with Mayor Petersen and the City Attorney Kymber Housley, and they told me that they will support for a two-year termination clause in the River Heights City agreement.

I truly believe that this will not be an issue for Logan but it may be one you would like to think through by allowing the council vote to stand and asking your legal council to negotiate on your behalves with Logan City Attorney and Mayor. I suggest that you tell us what you want to have in the agreement and we will try to see ways we can accommodate your needs. We are at the beginning stage of updating the expired sewer agreement of the client cities (Providence, North Logan, Hyde Park, and Smithfield) and I am sure that every City will have some specific needs they want to have in the agreement. It will be in your best interest to keep your options open and seek an agreement that will meet your needs but also similar with the other cities.
