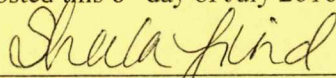

### 27 Motion #1

28 Councilmember Clausen moved to "adopt the minutes of the June 14, 2016 Council Meeting,  
29 and the evening's agenda." Councilmember Scott seconded the motion, which passed with Clausen,  
30 Scott, Wilson and Wright in favor. Smith was absent. No one opposed.

### 32 Motion #2

33 Councilmember Clausen moved to "pay the bills as listed, including a bill for \$100 to the  
34 Matthews family for delivery of the newsletter." Councilmember Scott seconded the motion, which  
35 passed with Clausen, Scott, Wilson and Wright in favor. Smith was absent. No one opposed.

### 37 Motion #3

38 Councilmember Wright moved to "adopt Ordinance #3-2016, An Ordinance to Adjust a  
39 Common Boundary between River Heights and Logan City, contingent upon the property description  
40 being modified to keep 33 feet adjacent to 500 South in River Heights City for a right-of-way."  
41 Councilmember Scott seconded the motion, which passed with Clausen, Scott, and Wright in favor.  
42 Wilson opposed. Smith was absent.

### 44 Motion #4

45 Councilmember Clausen moved to "adopt Ordinance # 4-2016, An Ordinance Providing for the  
46 Compensation of Elected and Statutory Officers of River Heights City, with a change to the payment

47 schedule; all elected officials and the finance director will be paid monthly, others will be paid  
48 biweekly.” Councilmember Scott seconded the motion, which carried with Clausen, Scott, and Wright  
49 in favor. Wilson opposed because she didn’t agree with the Council getting a raise, but agrees with the  
50 other raises. Smith was absent.

53 Proceedings of the Meeting:  
54

55 The River Heights City Council met at 6:30 p.m. in the Ervin R. Crosbie Council Chambers in  
56 the River Heights City Building on Tuesday, July 12, 2016.

57 Opening Remarks and Pledge of Allegiance: Councilmember Clausen opened the meeting with  
58 patriotic comments. Mayor Brackner led the group in the Pledge of Allegiance.

59 Adoption of Previous Minutes and Agenda: Minutes of the June 14, 2016 Council Meetings,  
60 were reviewed.

61 **Councilmember Clausen moved to “adopt the minutes of the June 14, 2016 Council**  
62 **Meeting, and the evening’s agenda.” Councilmember Scott seconded the motion, which passed**  
63 **with Clausen, Scott, Wilson and Wright in favor. Smith was absent. No one opposed.**

64 Pay Bills: The bills were presented and discussed. Recorder Lind asked if the Council would  
65 consider adding a bill, in the amount of \$100, from the Matthews family, who delivered the newsletter  
66 this month. They agreed

67 **Councilmember Clausen moved to “pay the bills as listed, including a bill for \$100 to the**  
68 **Matthews family for delivery of the newsletter.” Councilmember Scott seconded the motion,**  
69 **which passed with Clausen, Scott, Wilson and Wright in favor. Smith was absent. No one**  
70 **opposed.**

71 Finance Director Report: FD Grover presented and discussed the Financial Summary to date.

72 Purchase Requisition: There was none. Councilmember Clausen reminded that the city  
73 requires three different bids for purchases over \$7,500. He asked that the Council see the bids before a  
74 decision is made on a purchase that exceeds this limit.

75 Public Works Report and Discussion: PWD Nelson reported on the following:

- 76 • He has talked with Logan Public Works Director Mark Nielson about the intersection at 1000  
77 East and Lamplighter, which they plan to redo in conjunction with the new Johnson  
78 Subdivision. Logan City is paying for all the footwork on associated costs. Mr. Nelson said, it  
79 sounds like Logan is going to cover everything except the sidewalk/curb and gutter on the east  
80 side. It will be a Logan road afterward (rather than county) from Center Street to the Johnson  
81 Subdivision. Mr. Nelson feels Logan should maintain the curb and gutter since they will own  
82 the road. They will have a price for the project soon.
- 83 • The surveyor should be here tomorrow to get started on the 600 East Road project.
- 84 • The surveys are being drawn up on the 700 South easements.
- 85 • The 600 South road is cut. They are waiting for the guy with the laydown machine to say when  
86 he is available. Once they find out, they’ll hurry and get everything in place. He’s planning on  
87 the city doing as much as they can. Mayor Brackner asked if they should get bids. Mr. Nelson  
88 felt the cost of the laydown machine wouldn’t reach \$7,500. Councilmember Clausen and FD  
89 Grover asked for bids anyhow. Mayor Brackner felt bids weren’t needed if the work was being  
90 done internally. Mr. Nelson will find out what the cost would be for the machine. If its over  
91 \$7,500 he will get other bids.
- 92 • The 700 South water line looping should go out for bid this week.

- The roads seal coating is finished for the year.  
Administrative Report: Recorder Lind didn't have anything.

Public Comment: There was none.

Public Hearing to Gather Input on the Formation of a Water District: Gordon Zilles and Bob Fotheringham were in attendance to present the Purpose Statement and answer questions regarding the formation of a water district. Mr. Zilles explained his position on the County Council. Mr. Fotheringham is the County Water Coordinator.

Mayor Brackner read the Call to Order and the First Protest Declaration from the hearing outline. Bob Fotheringham handed out copies of and discussed the Purpose Statement. He asked for questions.

Darlene Craney asked what would constitute a protest. Mayor Brackner said it is a written statement of opposition toward allowing the issue to go on the ballot. She asked if there needed to be a reason why. She was told there doesn't. Mayor Brackner said there would need to be 25% of the voters, of the last presidential election, to file a protest for it to make a difference. It doesn't need to be the same people who voted in the election, but they do need to be a registered voter.

Cindy Schaub asked what the District really does. She was given a handout to read. Mr. Fotheringham explained the District is a form of government that manages water under the state of Utah. The districts in Salt Lake are planning for Cache Valley's water eventually, so it needs to be protected. He assured that the District can't interfere with personal shares. It will provide continuity in the county and manage water that may become available.

Ms. Craney asked if it would be the first district in the state. Mr. Fotheringham said it will be the first board in which the members are voted in and set up in this particular way. There will be seven people voted in from the seven different areas of the valley. Additionally, one person will be appointed over agricultural.

Ms. Craney asked the reasons that some people object to the District. Mr. Fotheringham said people can't see what's in it for them. They also object because it's a taxing entity. But, they can only tax up to 2 mils. They won't have taxing ability for the first four years, until all the board is elected.

Mr. Zilles hopes everyone will think this through. The ones that will really benefit from this District is our grandkids and great-grandkids. There won't be a big benefit for those of us here. The tax is for research and studies. If they do a project, it will be for paid by those that benefit from it.

Vic Little, of Paradise Town Council, said he came to see how other cities are handling their hearings. He feels if we don't come together as a community, our valley will lose its water. They need a way to get some money for research. He used to be against the District but has changed his mind.

Dennis Rhoton asked if the District would cause River Heights to lose any control over their culinary water. Mr. Fotheringham said absolutely not. The District cannot take away water.

Councilmember Wilson asked if the District will charge any more fees for irrigation water. Mr. Fotheringham said there are no additional fees on specific water. The charge will be through taxes. The only fees charged will be for specific projects and will be paid for by those that are benefitting from the new projects. The tax will be used for a strategy that will help all those in the valley.

Councilmember Wilson asked what the State of Utah Water Division does and if the District would take over their job. Mr. Fotheringham explained they'll do the same as they have always done. Ms. Wilson wondered if both entities would be managing the same water. Mr. Fotheringham recommended reading a specific report that explains it. Ms. Wilson asked if the District would have an arm that will ask for proof of usage. She was told no, that still belongs to the state.

138 Mayor Brackner continued to read from the hearing outline, explaining the process for filing a  
139 protest. There were no further questions. He closed the hearing.

140 Mr. Zilles thanked all those in attendance for coming.

141 Public Hearing to Discuss and Adopt an Ordinance Regarding a Boundary Adjustment between  
142 River Heights and Logan City: Mayor Brackner explained the location of the property that is presently  
143 in River Heights. River Heights could not provide them with water and sewer without incurring a cost  
144 of about half a million dollars. Logan City can provide the needed utilities. He reminded that the  
145 Council previously passed a resolution in support of adjusting the city boundaries to move this  
146 property into Logan.

147 Councilmember Wright asked if the ordinance's property description included the 500 South  
148 33' right-of-way. Mayor Brackner said the right-of-way description hasn't been finished up yet.  
149 Bracken Atkinson verified that it has not been incorporated into the legal description yet. He requested  
150 an approval of the ordinance with a contingency of the right-of-way description.

151 **Councilmember Wright moved to "adopt Ordinance #3-2016, An Ordinance to Adjust a**  
152 **Common Boundary between River Heights and Logan City, contingent upon the property**  
153 **description being modified to keep 33 feet adjacent to 500 South in River Heights City for a**  
154 **right-of-way." Councilmember Scott seconded the motion, which passed with Clausen, Scott,**  
155 **and Wright in favor. Wilson opposed. Smith was absent.**

156 Public Hearing Regarding the Adoption of an Ordinance Providing for the Compensation of  
157 Elected and Statutory Officers of River Heights City: Mayor Brackner discussed the proposal from the  
158 budget workshops. He read the ordinance aloud. It was pointed out that the mayor, council and  
159 finance director get paid once/month. The other employees get paid biweekly.

160 **Councilmember Clausen moved to "adopt Ordinance # 4-2016, An Ordinance Providing**  
161 **for the Compensation of Elected and Statutory Officers of River Heights City, with a change to**  
162 **the payment schedule; all elected officials and the finance director will be paid monthly, others**  
163 **will be paid biweekly." Councilmember Scott seconded the motion, which carried with Clausen,**  
164 **Scott, and Wright in favor. Wilson opposed because she didn't agree with the Council getting a**  
165 **raise, but agrees with the other raises. Smith was absent.**

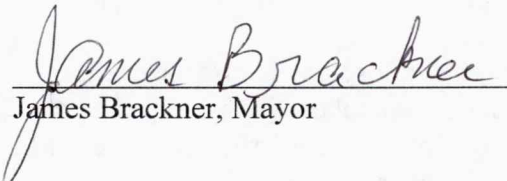

## CACHE WATER DISTRICT

### SUGGESTED PUBLIC HEARING OUTLINE

- I. **Call to Order:** After the pledge of allegiance and/or prayer, according to the custom of the county or municipal council, and any other appropriate business has been conducted, the person chairing the meeting should declare something like: "The public hearing of the Prater Heights [name of municipality or county] Council is called to order for the purpose of allowing the public to ask questions and obtain further information regarding issues contained in or raised by a Resolution adopted by the Council that will place before the voters the question of whether a water conservancy district to be known as the Cache Water District should be created is declared to be open at 6:50 p.m. on 12<sup>th</sup> July 2016 [date] at 520 S 500 E [location of the public hearing]. The other members of the Council who are present are: Robert K. Scott, Doug Clausen, Blake Wright, Dixie Wilton introduce the other members and, if it is a joint public hearing, identify each participating municipality and call upon the Mayor or Council Chair, as appropriate, to introduce the members of the additional Council(s)."

- II. **First Protest Declaration [A declaration at the start of the hearing is statutorily mandated]:** The person chairing the meeting should declare: "The proposal for the voters to vote on the creation of the Cache Water District is the subject of a series of public hearings to be held by the Cache County Council and by the legislative body of each participating municipality within Cache County. Following the public hearings, the question of whether the Cache Water District will be created will be placed before the voters during the November, 2016 general election. Owners of private land or registered voters residing within a participating municipality who do not want the proposition to be placed before the voters may file a protest with the clerk or recorder of that municipality and owners of private land or registered voters residing within unincorporated portions of Cache County may file a protest with the Cache County Clerk. All protests must be filed by no later than September 12, 2016, which is 60 days after the last public hearing. If sufficient protests are timely filed, either the election will not be held or the municipality or unincorporated Cache County, for which adequate protests have been timely filed, will be removed from the proposal to create the Cache Water District and from the election. Protests are adequate if filed by the owners of at least 25% of the total private land area and at least 15% of the private land value within the subject municipality or unincorporated Cache County (each of which is an "applicable area") or by registered voters residing within the applicable area equal in number to at least 25% of the number of votes cast in the area for the office of President of the United States at the most recent election prior to the adoption of the Resolution. If adequate protests are not filed, the election will be held and the voters will decide whether the Cache Water District will be created."

- III. **Presentation of Information:** The person chairing the meeting should introduce the person(s) who will explain the reasoning behind the proposal to create the Cache Water District and benefits that are anticipated as a result of the creation of the District and will



respond to questions from members of the public. Time should then be turned over to the identified person(s) to present basic information.

- IV. **Public Comments and Questions:** The Chair should invite members of the public in attendance to identify themselves for the record and present questions and comments respecting the proposition to present before the voters the creation of the Cache Water District. [Reasonable time limitations may consistently be applied and the chair may exercise reasonable control over the comments, but it is recommended that anyone wishing to speak be given an opportunity to do so. It is also recommended that questions be answered as they are raised, rather than be deferred.]
- V. **Final Protest Statement [A second declaration at the end of the public hearing is mandated by statute]:** After everyone has been heard, the Chair should thank them for attending and participating and state the following: “As stated at the beginning of this public hearing, any owner of private land and any registered voter who desires that the election on the question of the creation of the Cache Water District not take place may file a protest with the Cache County Clerk, if the land is located or the registered voter resides in the unincorporated portion of Cache County, or with the municipal clerk or recorder if the land is located within a participating municipality or the registered voter resides within the municipality. The protest must be filed on or before September 12, 2016, which is 60 days after the date of the last of the series of public hearings dealing with the proposed creation of the Cache Water District.”
- VI. **Close Hearing:** Declare the public hearing to be closed.
- VII. **Other Business and Adjournment:** Conduct other business on the agenda, if any, before declaring the meeting to be adjourned.

- Undertake environmental and other studies to provide information necessary to make proper, timely water use decisions
- Obtain grants and low cost loans for the upgrade and construction of needed water infrastructure

ORDINANCE 3-2016

AN ORDINANCE TO ADJUST A COMMON BOUNDARY BETWEEN RIVER HEIGHTS CITY AND LOGAN CITY

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE RIVER HEIGHTS MUNICIPAL COUNCIL, STATE OF UTAH, AS FOLLOWS:

WHEREAS, the Municipal Council of the City of River Heights finds that it is in the best interest of River Heights to adjust the boundary between the City of River Heights and the City of Logan; and

WHEREAS, the property is identified as parcel #02-026-0002 in the parcel records of Cache County, State of Utah, located at approximately 200 East and 600 South in River Heights, Utah, and comprising approximately 5.44 acres; and

WHEREAS, the boundary adjustment as set forth below will not materially injure the public in general or any person.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED, that the River Heights City Council has approved the adjustment of the common boundary in accordance with Utah Code Section 10-2-419, between River Heights City and Logan City to reflect that the following described parcel, which is currently located within the municipality of River Heights City now be located in Logan City with the common boundary being adjusted accordingly:

This ordinance shall take effect immediately upon publication and passage of a similar appropriate ordinance by the City of Logan.

ORDINANCE NO. 4-2016

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE COMPENSATION OF ELECTED AND STATUTORY OFFICERS OF RIVER HEIGHTS CITY

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE RIVER HEIGHTS CITY COUNCIL THAT:

1. Repealer. All previous salary of compensation ordinances regarding elected and statutory officers hereby are repealed.
2. Compensation. The monthly compensation of the elected and statutory officers shall be as follows:

Mayor . . . . .	\$600.00
Council member . . . . .	400.00
Finance Director . . . . .	458.33
Treasurer . . . . .	19.76/hr
Recorder . . . . .	23.40/hr
3. Payment. The treasurer shall pay each elected official and the Finance Director monthly . All other statutory officers will be paid bi-weekly. Payments will be by automatic deposit or by delivery of a check drawn on the municipal checking account.
4. Per Diem. Each member of the governing body shall receive mileage and per diem for all trips approved by the governing body according to the schedules adopted by the Utah Department of Finance.
