The River Heights City Council met at 6:30 p.m. in the Ervin R. Crosbie Council Chambers in the River Heights City Building on Tuesday, January 23, 2018. Councilmember Scott opened the meeting with a thought. Councilmember Thatcher led the group in the Pledge of Allegiance.

Adoption of Previous Minutes and Agenda: Minutes of the January 9, 2018 Council Meeting, were reviewed.

Councilmember Clausen moved to "adopt the minutes of the January 9, 2018 Council Meeting and the evening's agenda." Councilmember Wilson seconded the motion, which passed with Clausen, Scott, Thatcher, Wilson and Wright in favor. No one opposed.

Pay Bills: The bills were presented and discussed. Treasurer Wilker requested the addition of a bill to reimburse Mayor Rasmussen, in the amount of \$345.00, for youth council registration to attend Local Official's Day at the State Capitol. Ms. Willker pointed out the fire contract invoice was \$300 less than the amount stated in the contract. Mayor Rasmussen felt the bill was for this year and the higher amount will be charged next year. He will check with Logan City to make sure the invoice was correct.

Councilmember Clausen moved to "pay the bills as listed, including the youth conference invoice in the amount of \$345.00." Councilmember Thatcher seconded the motion, which passed with Clausen, Scott, Thatcher, Wilson and Wright in favor. No one opposed.

<u>Finance Director Report:</u> FD Grover pointed out the financials are tracking pretty well. The large fire bill was not included on the report.

Purchase Requisition: There were none.

Public Works Report and Discussion: PWD Nelson was absent.

Administrative Report: Recorder Lind asked Mayor Rasmussen and Councilmember Thatcher if they would like to have a blurb about themselves on the City's website. If so, they can submit one to her by email.

<u>Public Comment:</u> Diane Rhoton handed in some requests from the Riverdale residents, as suggested by Mayor Brackner. She asked how much Logan City charges River Heights for sewer. Councilmember Clausen said it varies each month. Ms. Rhoton said its high because there is a lot of water that seeps into the system. Mr. Clausen said that may or may not be the case. Ms. Rhoton said she and some other ladies talked with someone at Logan City and that is what they were told. She also said the residents in Riverdale are all on septic. She was concerned if a city sewer line goes in someday, their high water table will infiltrate the system.

Ms. Rhoton said all the Riverdale residents (except one) are for a moratorium against building. They are very concerned about the speed limit on their road, especially when the apartments are built. They desire a fence that will keep people away from the road. Logan City told her Wasatch Properties doesn't intend to install a fence; their plan is to landscape.

Ms. Rhoton has spoken to the Bear River Health Department. They said they won't allow any more septic tanks in the area to prevent contamination to the water supply. There are already more septic tanks that they originally said they would allow. Mayor Rasmussen explained a city sewer system wouldn't leach into the ground like septic systems.

Councilmember Wilson asked how far they want the fence to go. Councilmember Wright thought it would be a few hundred feet. Jim Brackner said Logan City previously said they would be willing to work with River Heights, although we probably don't have much leverage now that the property is in Logan.

Ms. Rhoton asked again about a moratorium on building. Lisa Ellis has told her they plan to develop townhomes in the area. Ms. Rhoton would like to see the Ellis property developed into one acre lots.

Ms. Rhoton reviewed the resident's requests for a 10 mph speed sign and signs that say "Local Traffic Only." Jim Brackner said the city's attorney has said its illegal to post local traffic only on a public road. She asked if the council would agree to the other items on their request list. She was told they can't discuss it tonight because it wasn't on the agenda. Mayor Rasmussen said they could discuss it at one meeting and come to a decision at another meeting. He will let Ms. Rhoton know when it's scheduled.

Crystal Walker introduced herself as a River Heights resident who is interested in renting a portion of the old school building for workout and nutrition classes. She works for Reps For a Cause, and explained that a portion of the fees she charges goes towards Underground Railroad and local causes. She would like to hold her workout classes in the morning. Her friend runs the program in Monroe City and she has seen how it's brought the community together. She would love to set up the program in River Heights for the same reasons. She is also working on programs for kids to keep them fit during the summer. The business is for profit, as well as the contributions they give. She expressed her desire to rent the old school building. Councilmember Clausen explained they don't know yet if the building will require any upgrades before renting it out. They will find this out at some point.

<u>Discuss Entering into an Agreement with the Cache Humane Society for Animal Impound Services</u>: Councilmember Thatcher likes the idea of the Humane Society handling River Heights' stray dogs. She said the shelter is set up for this and is a very nice facility.

Recorder Lind explained this idea was brought up by Animal Control Officer Floyd Powell. Other cities are switching to use the Humane Society because they are open on the weekends so pet owners won't have to wait until Monday to pick up their dogs. They are willing to collect fees in behalf of the City, when the City Office isn't open. They also won't charge for more than 5 boarding days.

Recorder Lind recommended setting the contract date as February 1, 2018. She asked if the Council wanted to change the "six-month notice of termination" date. After discussion, they decided to leave it.

Councilmember Thatcher moved to "accept the Agreement for Animal Impound Services Between River Heights City and the Cache Humane Society with a contract date of February 1, 2018." Councilmember Clausen seconded the motion, which carried with Clausen, Scott, Thatcher, Wilson and Wright in favor. No one opposed.

Motion to Ratify the Appointment of Todd Rasmussen to the Wastewater Rate Setting

Committee: Mayor Rasmussen informed he attended the recent Wastewater Rate Setting Committee

Meeting. The committee requested an official note stating he had been appointed by the City Council to represent River Heights on the Board. He stated he is willing to serve on this committee, if the Council were supportive.

Councilmember Thatcher moved to "appoint Mayor Todd Rasmussen to represent River Heights City on the Wastewater Rate Setting Committee." Councilmember Scott seconded the motion, which carried with Clausen, Scott, Thatcher, Wilson and Wright in favor. No one opposed.

<u>Discuss Status of Tennis Courts and Other Park Spaces Regarding Development and Use:</u>
Councilmember Wilson has taken a tour of the park and found some issue for them to think about. The park in Saddlerock is small and she doesn't think it will hold anything.

In regards to the tennis courts, Councilmember Wilson feels they need patched, resurfaced or ripped up. She recommended ripping them up and replacing them with post tension. She warned this could cost between \$100,000 and \$150,000, but would like to apply for RAPZ money. If they apply and don't get funding, she suggested going with one of the other options. Councilmember Wright explained that post tension is done with a thicker slab of concrete and metal cables that are tightened. The base will never need to be replaced, but the surface still will need to be redone periodically. Currently, the tennis courts base cracks due to settling and weather changes. He is very supportive of the post tension idea.

Councilmember Wilson said the courts are not terrible right now, but she is looking ahead. She asked if she could apply for the RAPZ tax this year. Councilmember Clausen suggested they decide first how much the city will contribute. Ms. Wilson said they can count labor, such as the public works employees taking the fencing down and putting it up again, if they are willing. Last time the city received RAPZ money, the city put up 15% of the cost. Mr. Wright doesn't guess RAPZ would award 75%. Councilmember Thatcher said its possible, based on other cities receiving large amounts to fund big projects. Mayor Rasmussen feels it would be of benefit to look up what's been granted in the past, to get an idea of how much to ask for. Ms. Thatcher suggested talking to county council members to find out what they are looking for in projects they award funding to. Ms. Wilson feels it's worth applying for.

Jim Brackner asked Councilmember Wilson if she would consider adding two pickleball courts. She said no, because she wants the city to take care of what we've got first.

Councilmember Thatcher would like to look into CGBT grants. Councilmember Clausen informed they have looked into this before and found River Heights doesn't qualify, due to the median household income.

Councilmember Wright said he is supportive of this project and pointed out the courts are well used by non-citizens, as well as River Heights residents. This may be beneficial to point out on the grant application.

Councilmember Wilson will get some bids and then have Councilmember Clausen help her fill out the RAPZ application. Once the tennis courts are taken care of, she would be willing to discuss a splash pad. Mr. Clausen said a splash pad might be able to be funded by impact fees.

Mayor Rasmussen informed that his brother has been involved in numerous developments. He has a lot of data about what works in parks and what doesn't. Councilmember Wilson's idea is to have different things in the various parks, to draw people to the different areas.

Councilmember Clausen recommended talking to PWD Nelson to find out what they would be willing to do as sweat equity.

Councilmember Wright suggested Councilmember Wilson contact Miles Minson, who is a really good resource on post tension.

Mayor and Council Reports: Councilmember Thatcher asked about her responsibilities on the Council. Mayor Rasmussen said, as of now, she will be in charge of the same things Councilmember Smith was over. He has asked Mr. Smith to meet with her to discuss the responsibilities.

Councilmember Clausen asked what was decided on signing the sewer contract. Mayor Rasmussen has some questions he needs answered. After he talks to the people who can answer them, he will bring it back to the Council.

Councilmember Clausen has talked to Engineer Rasmussen about a Safe to School grant for the 700 South sidewalk. If we do apply, we may not know until July. The grant we already have requires the work to be done by June. Jim Brackner said the \$30,000 grant is to be reimbursed after the whole

project has been done. Mr. Clausen will discuss it further with Engineer Rasmussen. They don't want to put the grant they already have in jeopardy.

Mayor Rasmussen discussed his negotiation ideas for the Anna Marie Anderson property. Jim Brackner said his letter informed Ms. Anderson she had until January 17, to contact the city. Councilmember Clausen suggested the 700 South sidewalk be on the next agenda so the engineers can get it out for bid in February. Jim Brackner recommended hurrying to work with Mark Nielson (of Logan City) before he starts another job. Mr. Nielson has said Logan would have made Wasatch Properties install their portion of the 700 South sidewalk at the time of their development. Mayor Rasmussen will work on this.

Councilmember Wright said he had been thinking about the privacy fence on Riverdale Avenue, discussed earlier in the meeting. River Heights didn't cause the problem. He suggested checking with Logan since it's in their jurisdiction. He thinks someone should try to get Logan and the developer to see what they are willing to do since they are the cause. Mayor Rasmussen agreed and will make some contacts. Diane Rhoton asked if there were some type of law to disallow buildings to be so close to private properties when they are between two different cities. Mr. Wright said he hasn't heard of this. Councilmember Wilson remembered something about Wasatch planning to install a crash gate. Ms. Rhoton said it will be four feet high. Jim Brackner suggested contacting Mark Nielson about this, as well as the 700 South sidewalk. He will know the background on the issue. He was tremendously helpful on their 1000 East project.

Councilmember Clausen reminded Mayor Rasmussen about an email he sent concerning a 1000 East resident wanting rocks in his yard to keep cars from crashing into his house. Mr. Rasmussen said they will go for a ride to see and discuss it.

Mayor Rasmussen said Providence City is discussing annexing 17 acres up to the line of the Chugg property. He wonders if the intent is to combine the two properties. Councilmember Thatcher said Providence discussed this area for a future reservoir, at the meeting she attended. Jim Brackner said Providence staff has told him, the Ironwood development may be done in three phases. Mayor Rasmussen has talked to Providence Mayor John Drew multiple times and also to Developer Jeff Jackson. He wants them to know River Heights' desire to be involved, no matter where the property ends up. He requested a workshop with the Council on their ideas. Diane Rhoton asked how a development would impact the traffic by the school and wonders what can be done about it. She was told it will be part of the discussions.

The meeting adjourned at 8:10 p.m.

Cache Humane Society Agreement

A couple of weeks ago our animal control officer, Floyd Powell, informed us that the other cities are using the Cache Humane Society for boarding dogs, rather than Bridgerland Animal Hospital. Some of the reasons are:

- 1. Bridgerland is a veterinary clinic and not set up for boarding many dogs. CHS is set up for housing many animals
- 2. Bridgerland is closed on the weekends so dogs which are impounded on a Friday can't be picked up by the owners until Monday. CHS is open on the weekends.
- 3. CHS will work with us on collecting fees on the weekends so dog owners don't have to wait until Monday.
- 4. If a dog hasn't been licensed, CHS will release the dog (only on a weekend) with a fix-it ticket. During RHC office hours, dogs will need to be licensed before getting released to their owners.
- 5. CHS will not charge the City for more than 5 days boarding (for unclaimed dogs).
- 6. CHS charges \$15/night. Bridgerland charges \$18.50.

I've asked enough questions and trust Floyd Powell's opinion to the point I feel comfortable recommending this change to the Council. A copy of the agreement is in the Drive.

AGREEMENT FOR ANIMAL IMPOUND SERVICES BETWEEN RIVER HEIGHTS CITY AND THE CACHE HUMANE SOCIETY

THIS AGREEMENT ("Agreement"), dated for convenience this 23rd day of January, 2018 is made and entered into between River Heights City ("Entity"), a Municipal Corporation of the State of Utah and the Cache Humane Society ("CHS") a non-profit corporation.

RECITALS

WHEREAS, the Entity wishes to contract with CHS for the performance of animal impound and like services; and

WHEREAS, CHS is agreeable to rendering services on the terms and conditions set forth.

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the promises and covenants contained herein and for other good and valuable consideration, the sufficiency and receipt of which is hereby acknowledged, the Parties agree as follows:

A. DEFINITIONS

ADOPTION: The placement of an un-owned or relinquished animal in a new home.

IMPOUNDING JURISDICTIONS: All jurisdictions holding current Impound Service Contracts with CHS.

RELINQUISHED ANIMAL: One that has been held the required period of time without being claimed.

B. ENTITY'S RESPONSIBILITIES:

1. Payment of Fees. The Entity shall, within 20 days after receiving an invoice for services, remit payment to CHS based on the following fee schedule:

a. Canine Boarding \$15.00 per dayb. Quarantine \$20.00 per day

c. Canine Euthanasia & Disposal \$20.00

2. Delivery of Animals. The Entity shall deliver to the shelter maintained by CHS at 2370 West 200 North, Logan, any animal deemed appropriate for impound.

C. CACHE HUMANE SOCIETY'S RESPONSIBILITIES

Canine Impound

- 1. Ensure 24-hour access to the building for Entity's law enforcement personnel.
- 2. Reserve 10 kennels for use by Impounding Jurisdictions.
- 3. Provide shelter, food, water, and vaccination of impounded animals.
- 4. Bill Entity for services provided at least on a monthly basis.
- 5. Comply with the provisions of the Utah State Municipal Animal Shelter Pet Sterilization Act.

D. GENERAL PROVISIONS

- 1. Existing Agreements: Upon execution of this Agreement, any prior existing service agreements between Entity and CHS for the provision of animal services will be terminated.
- 2. **Shelter Services:** CHS shall provide staff and facilities for the execution of this Agreement, including the impounding, receiving of unwanted animals, housing, and feeding of animals through the required hold period. Disposition of animals after the hold period shall be at the discretion of CHS.
- 3. Maintenance of Records: Records of animals impounded, including the description of each animal, date of impound shall be entered by the Animal Control Officer delivering the animal to the shelter facility. CHS will add to this record: date and manner of disposal, treatment received, the name of the person redeeming the animal (if applicable). These records will be maintained by CHS and made available to Entity when appropriate.
- 4. **Term and Effective Period:** This Agreement shall become effective on January 23, 2018 and shall remain in effect until terminated by either party, or until January 23, 2019, whichever occurs first.
- 5. **Termination of Agreement:** This Agreement may be terminated by either party, with or without cause by giving written notice to the addresses listed in this Agreement, at least six months prior to the termination date.
- 6. Entire Agreement; Modification; Additional Agreements: This Agreement constitutes the entire agreement between the Parties pertaining to the subject matter hereof and supersedes all prior agreement and understandings between the Parties with respect to the subject matter hereof. This Agreement may not be modified, amended or supplemented or otherwise changed, except by a written document executed by an authorized representative of each of the Parties. The Parties will request and seek written consent of the other Party prior to entering into an agreement that impacts or relates to the purposes of this program.

- 9. Non-Discrimination: No person shall illegally be excluded from participation in, denied the benefits of, or be subjected to discrimination under this Agreement on account of their race, color, religion, national origin, age, sex, sexual orientation, ancestry, marital status, pregnancy, childbirth or related conditions, medical condition, mental or physical disability or veteran's status.
- 10. **Assignments:** Except as otherwise provided for herein, neither party shall assign any of its obligations or rights hereunder without permission of the other.
