Crosbie Council Chambers on September 13, 2022. 29 30 Pledge of Allegiance Adoption of Prior Minutes and Agenda: Minutes for the August 23, 2022, Planning 31 Commission Meeting were reviewed. 32 Commissioner Lehnig moved to "approve the minutes of the August 23, 2022, Commission 33 Meeting, as well as the evenings agenda." Commissioner Wakefield seconded the motion, which 34 35 carried with Cooley, Lehnig, Schaub, and Wakefield in favor. No one opposed. Pitcher was absent. Public Comment on Land Use: There was none. 36 Discuss Prohibiting Dog Kennels on Vacant Lots: Commissioner Cooley said there is currently 37 an issue where a landowner is kenneling his dogs on a vacant lot. Many neighbors have complained 38 about constant barking. The mayor has asked the Planning Commission to consider rewording the 39 40 code, to not allow dogs on lots where there is no owner present. 41 Commissioner Cooley said he had checked three neighboring cities' codes looking for ideas. They address nuisance issues, which include barking dogs as public nuisance, but not kenneling dogs 42

on vacant lots. He pointed out that the River Heights City Code allows the mayor to issue citations for

Commissioner Lehnig said she had given some thought to the situation and suggested adding the following verbiage to 5-2: "It is unlawful for any person to own, keep or harbor within the city limits any dog on property that is not their primary residence."

Commissioner Schaub suggested adding "owner occupied or primary residence" to 10-12-1:A.21.

Commissioner Cooley read from Providence's nuisance code, which included annoying noises, such as dogs. He suggested putting more teeth into the current River Heights code.

Mayor Thompson joined the meeting through Zoom.

Commissioner Cooley asked Mayor Thompson if the current code was not sufficient. The mayor responded that he liked the wording presented by Commissioner Lehnig. Commissioner Schaub pointed out that the current dog situation is the first time they had heard of this kind of situation. She was unsure about changing the code to address it at this point. Mayor Thompson said there are other areas in the city where this could potentially happen in the future. He was trying to be forward thinking in taking care of it before it became a bigger problem. He felt the suggested language was right in line with what they would be trying to do. He was concerned that a property owner may request a rezone to agricultural so they could have a dog kennel on a property with no dwelling.

They determined to add the suggested sentence as 5-2-5:D (bump other letters down) and title it, "Dogs must be kept at primary residence."

Councilmember Wright said the bigger challenge is getting the code enforced. He said 5-2-12 addresses violations as a Class C misdemeanor.

Commissioner Cooley understood that the property with the current dog instance also has horses and goats present, which are defined as livestock, which are not allowed in residential zones. He had heard there have been horses on the property within the last year, but not goats. He asked if the city wanted to notify them that they can't keep goats in this area, which is zoned residential but has been treated as agricultural for years.

Recorder Lind informed of a recent goat situation where a citizen was confused by the city not allowing him to have goats in a residential zone. He explained his reading of the definition of Domesticated Animals (in 5-2) included goats. The definition of Pet (also in 5-2) included 'domesticated animal.' Based on this he felt goats were allowed as pets.

They wanted further discussion at the next meeting. Councilmember Wright pointed out that they needed to make sure they coordinate what they do in Title 5, with Title 10, in regard to domesticated animals.

Discussion was held on the zone abbreviations for Chart 10-12-1. Recorder Lind and Councilmember Wright will work on trying to clarify them.

The meeting adjourned at 7:30 p.m.
